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Nomos vs. physis


Nomos (convention)


Is morality merely arbitrarily dictated by society? • Protagoras: "Man is the measure of all things"

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
Physis (nature) Is there a higher sanction to be found in something else, like the natural world?



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




Arbitration of disagreements


No one can switch sides
