






## Neolithic settlements

- Known mainly through pottery





 Oral history through poetry and music
















#### Sacred bull horns


## Minoan gods and goddesses

- Association with animals





- Fierce competition for resources and markets






#### Words the Indo-European Greek had to borrow

- Maritime terms, words for the sea, shipping - (e.g.  $\theta \acute{a}\lambda \alpha \sigma \sigma \alpha$  thálassa "sea")
- Words relating to Mediterranean agriculture
  - (e.g. ϝἐλαία welaia "olive", άμπελος ampelos "vine")
- Words regarding rulers, given by
  - the populace
     (e.g. τύραννος tyrannos "tyrant"; εαναξ wanax "warrior-king")
- Building technology
- (e.g. πύργος pyrgos "tower")
- Personal names and theonyms
  - (e.g. Οδυσσεύς Odysseus)– (e.g. Ερμής Hermes)
- Place names
- nth- (e.g. Κόρινθος Korinthos, Ζάκυνθος Zakynthos) -ss- (e.g. Παρνασσός Parnassos) -tt- (e.g. Λυκαβηττός Lykabettos)

- Indo-European mastery of wheel and axle
- Mycenaean Greek chariots give battlefield mobility
- Primary conquest is economic, not military



- Adapted from the Minoan writing system
- First written evidence of the Greek language

- More accessible because the language is early Greek

#### Hittite treaties mention Greeks and Trojans

- Ahhiyawa (Achaeans)
- Drdny (Dardanians?)
- Wilusa (Ilios)
- Danaja (Danaans)

#### Troy (Ilios)

- Wealthy city on the eastern Aegean coast
- Founded before Minoans or Mycenaean Greeks (ca. 3500 BCE)
- Increasingly only possible rival for control of Aegean trade
